
Unicef Champions represent every class in school. They attend weekly meetings and they are central to the work we do.

What is a Rights Respecting School?

At our school we teach children about Children's Rights. These come from the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child UNCRC.

We currently hold Unicef's Rights
Respecting Award (RRSA) Level 2- the highest level
achievable.



The whole school has a Rights
Respecting ethos and children are
taught about Rights and how to respect
the rights of others.

As a result of our work we have increased levels of respectful

behaviours in school.
